Some of us want to "shift the monkey" and make it someone else's problem. Some have said, "Road Trip!" Some have even suggested a pep talk from Felicia Watson.

On a serious note, as I ponder this problem, I reflect on my journey through this union. I remember my first rep council meeting, thinking: What am I supposed to be doing?; Why is there a bus trip, and why is it on every single agenda?; Why do they care about the end-of-year social? Now that I look back, I believe the answer is quite simple.

The negative aspects of our profession often consume every fiber of our being, and the daily stresses that happen in our classrooms/buildings often overshadow the social aspect of our union. How many of us socialize with members from other buildings? How many of us even know what the situations are in other buildings? Two summers ago, I went to NYSUT Leadership, which took place in Washington DC. It was a week-long intensive training on NYSUT history, the role of unions, and how to be a better leader. Upon arrival, we were forced to partake in an icebreaker of finding individuals that fit certain characteristics. At the time, I thought: We're adults--why are we doing this? The presenter then stated that by the end of the week we would have friends for life. I initially scoffed at the idea that I would stay in contact with anyone, but as the week came to a close, I truly felt that I was part of a bigger picture. The stresses that others felt were the same stresses that I felt. Through the social aspects of the union, when I now attend functions, I know that Middletown has support ranging from Buffalo all the way to Long Island.

Summer Leadership Raises Autism Awareness

April is Autism Awareness Month. I'm sure many of you have heard the phrase, "Light It Up Blue" circling around. Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is an important condition for educators to understand, as it is the fastest growing developmental disability in the United States. One in sixty-eight children are affected and boys are four times more likely than girls to have a form of ASD.

I had the privilege of attending the NYSUT Leadership Conference this past summer. While there, I was able to participate in a workshop that focused on autism. This was especially exciting to me because it really hits home. My nephew and the child of one of my close friends are both affected by ASD. This was a huge factor in my decision to take this particular workshop. I wanted to learn more about autism so that I would be able to better understand their condition and actions.

The workshop started off by giving many different facts, figures and information about autism in general and the Autism Speaks organization. One thing that stuck out among these facts was a quote that they shared, "if you've met one person with autism, you've met one person with autism." This is so indicative of the reason why it is so essential for educators to understand the condition; it does not affect people in the same way.

At the end of the workshop, the presenters offered a resource to help aid the school community to understand and support students with autism. I believe this resource to be extremely valuable since the diagnosis of ASD changed from 1 in 106 to 1 in 68 between 2000 and 2010. How to keep your professional account updates on PD:

- 1) All <u>coursework PD</u> must be recorded on My Learning Plan (MLP). There is a place where you can <u>add</u> courses outside Middletown School District (grad, conferences, etc.). All coursework must be on MLP.
- 2) All <u>PD meetings</u> (faculty, M-I, department, grade level/cluster, etc.) must be recorded on the PD sheet that the district created (PD sheets can be found on the District website).
- 3) All PD Record Sheets must be sent to the Personnel Department at the Board of Education Office before the end of the school year.

Note: Personnel will upload all PD meetings to your account. However, they only do this once a year, at the end of the school year, so please be sure to have your PD record sheet in on time in order to receive credit for the PD you accumulated over the school year.
