A Message From Your MTA President Christopher White

"Where trade unions are most firmly organized, there are the rights of the people most respected."
-Samuel Gompers

The above quote, from the founder of the American Federation of Labor (AFL), has resonated with me in recent months. As president of the Middletown Teachers' Association, I frequently speak with our members, and more often than not, the conversations inevitably drift to the need for a stronger sense of unionism. After each of these conversations, I try to reflect on how can we improve, so that we are stronger with each passing day.

Since becoming MTA president, one goal I've set is to have a stronger more unified association. When building morale is low, it is easy for members to feel isolated. To that end, we are trying to bring in more activities that will foster strength and solidarity among all members from all buildings. For example, we have appointed Jennifer Younghans as our community relations chair, as well as Kastina Owusu-Ansah as our social events committee chair. Both members help foster activities that promote camaraderie while parlaying into our civic duties within our communities. Ultimately, a bonded workforce can work together to promote a change. I think about the steel strikes of 1919 and 1959, the textile strike of 1934, and most recently the Verizon workers strike, in which some of our own MTA members stood in solidarity near route 211. What would happen to those workers if only a handful of members showed up?

The Middletown Teachers' Association is over 650 members strong. I like to envision us all standing together on issues that bond us both locally and nationally. Recently, the MTA held its general assembly meeting regarding the state of our union, and I am thankful to those who attended. When I speak to members individually, they invariably talk about the need for a strong union. How can we achieve this? How can we make it so that our numbers speak strength? Some have suggested separate meetings at each building, so that all may have the opportunity to attend. Although I gave this suggestion serious consideration, I ultimately rejected it. Simply put, having separate meetings only fosters an environment of isolation among the buildings. Individual buildings already know what is happening in their buildings, it is important for us to hear what is happening in other buildings, to listen to the questions and concerns of members in other buildings. With the upcoming vote on the Constitutional Convention, and with the Supreme Court about to hear the Janus case, the threat to unionism is very real.

"There is strength in numbers" might be an overused cliché, but with the political climate being what it currently is in the country, it is not mere hyperbole to suggest that in two years time, we may not even have a union left.

So, I ask each of you: what can we do to become stronger? How can we show that we are stronger together? I leave you with a quote from Dr. King that is just as timely now as it was when he said it: "The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy."

It is my hope that by sharing a piece of our contract in each newsletter, we will continue to get stronger and more unified. After all, we ARE stronger together.

The MTA Offers Hurricane Relief

In an effort to help those devastated by Hurricane Maria in Puerto Rico, the MTA organized a collection to be delivered to the island. Volunteers Schadrac St. Louis and Adam-Andre Torres DeRosa (MHS), Nicole Fervan (MMS), Evelyn King (TTMS), Julie Galdun, Mildred Martinez, Michelle Ramirez, and Sylvia Hidago-Rivera (PPE), Elizabeth Hluchan (WAC), and Samantha Rodriguez (MH), coordinated, collected, organized, and prepared items for delivery. Donations were delivered to the Goshen Sheriff's Department and will be sent to Puerto Rico for distribution.

to the Hispanic Federation Unidos Disaster Relief and Recovery.



Along with the aid donated to the citizens of Puerto Rico, the MTA also collected backpacks to donate to those affected by Hurricane Harvey. MTA volunteers donated 131 backpacks, which were sent to Houston last month.
