Just Vote #NoConCon

As we are heading into the final stretch of our academic year, I am so encouraged by the increased involvement of our membership within the activities of the union. I am proud to share that we have a core group of reps from each building that have stepped up and are willing to bring the message of **Just Vote #NOCONCON** back to their buildings. Be on the lookout for fall activities that will continue with this message. Until then, I'd like to share a few more details here.

In our last newsletter, I focused on the detrimental effects that a Constitutional Convention could have on public employee pensions. Let's focus on our rights as employees to organize and collectively bargain in this one. Article 1, Section 17 of the NYS Constitution reads, "Employees shall have the right to organize and to bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing." Simply put, we have the right to form and join a union. This right was guaranteed to us in the NYS Bill of Rights in 1938.

NYSUT's Andy Pallotta, President and head of the union's legislative and political operation had this to say while he was still our Executive Vice President: "We all know labor unions — the rights to organize and bargain collectively — are under attack. The 'right-to-work' types who swept into Congress and the White House in November would love nothing more than to eviscerate labor laws all over the country. Well, I say, NOT in NEW YORK! The best way to protect the rights of working people in this state is to defeat the referendum on the constitutional convention next November. Do not let politically connected delegates, backed by anti-union billionaires, rewrite the document that guarantees your most basic rights. Vote NO and urge your friends and families to do the same."

Our negotiated contract ensures that we work 187 days (p.7), have a half day before Thanksgiving (p.7), can take up to three uncharged days of leave for a death within our immediate family (p.32), and are provided health insurance (p.48), just to name a few. Think about what could happen if our ability to negotiate is taken away. Think about the rights and benefits that we have now and what will be taken away. That's what is at risk if we allow this NYS Constitutional Convention to occur.
